

Club Meeting on 01 Dec

How easy it is to set up DMR? The December meeting had two presentations to explain:

TARG Chair, M0LHT, explained what a code plug is (an Excel type file of call signs and repeaters). You need to download this from the web into your radio:

- Download the file onto your computer
- Download a programme that can read the file
- Add some extra bits like your call sign and DMR ID
- Transfer the info into your radio from your computer

Gary, M5YRG, demonstrated a range of hot spots that connect your radio to the internet making DMR comms international.

Free to a Good Home



Some years ago I was given a 30m length of Heliax cable to run from my shack at the front of the house, around the side of the house, past the garage, down through tubes under the lawn and reappear at the far end of the garden for a VHF Yagi on a rotator Heliax is very efficient for VHF

frequencies, hence the N-type plug (photo). Now it is my turn to pass the favour on. If you have a genuine use for it, and can collect from Upminster – it's all yours.

I'm keeping the rotator for my HF antenna which has a single rigid radial for each frequency, that makes it very directional so the rotator can be used to swivel it to get the best reception. The same principle of the article below...
